Incident Update

LONDON BRIDGE INCIDENT - UPDATE FROM NCPP

Update on the incident in London this afternoon, 29th November 2019.

The National Coordinator Protect and Prepare, Detective Chief Superintendent Michael Orchard has provided the following update;

Firstly, I want to say that our thoughts are with the family and friends of those caught up in the dreadful incident at London Bridge. It is an absolute tragedy for everyone affected and on behalf of everybody within National Counter Terrorism Policing I want to extend my deepest sympathies..

Just before 1400hrs this afternoon, police officers responded to a stabbing incident near to London Bridge EC1.

A male suspect was shot dead by armed officers after being tackled by some incredibly brave members of the public. Three others have been injured and are being treated in hospital.

In addition to being armed with a knife, the suspect was also wearing a vest which resembled an IED.

Police now believe this to be a hoax device.

Since the national threat level was lowered to substantial earlier this month, Counter Terrorism Policing continue to remind businesses and the wider community that the threat is still very real. Substantial means that an attack is likely, and today's tragic event has unfortunately shown us that this is very much the case.

I encourage you as our senior business partners, to review your security plans and processes in light of today's incident. Links to our crowded places guidance, our eLearning product and Run Hide Tell advice have been circulated in our earlier bulletins following today's incident. I would encourage you all to visit the NaCTSO and CPNI websites and ensure that you are fully aware of the advice that is available to you.

The incident is linked to The Fishmongers Hall venue where events take place. I therefore strongly advise businesses who are hosting events in the future to review both their risk assessments in relation to attendance lists and accreditation, and also their search and screening policies.
